Election 2020: Historic Turnout for the Nation and Latino Community

16.5 million Latinos cast ballots, a 30% increase from Election 2016.


Turnout of Latino registered voters

- COVID-19
- Racial reckoning
- Competitive congressional and state races, many featuring Latino candidates

More than one of every 10 voters is expected to be Latino (11.1%), which mirrors the Latino share in 2020 and is a 20.5% increase from 2016.

Non-Hispanic turnout in **Arizona**, **California**, **Georgia**, **New York**, and **Texas** will likely mirror that of 2020.

Non-Hispanic vote in **New Jersey** projected to decrease by **4.9%** from 2020.

Factors affecting turnout include:

- The economy
- Continuing impact of COVID-19 pandemic on Latinos and electoral access
- Naturalization trends
- Competitive races in various states
- Changes in voter registration laws and practices
- Investment in Latino voter mobilization by candidates and political parties


NALEO Educational Fund projections are only the floor, with Latino voter turnout potentially exceeding them.

Latino Voter Mobilization: A Critical Need for Sustained Investment

The eligible Latino electorate will continue to grow even larger.

Increase in Latino voter turnout must keep pace with this growth for continued Latino political progress.

Candidates and political parties must invest significant resources in sustained mobilization of eligible Latino voters.
